Narrative of F.D. Summary

- Chapter 1

Douglass is separated at birth from his mother. His father is a white man, possibly his “master.” His Aunt Hester goes on a “date” with Col. Lloyd and is beaten by her master. He calls her a “d--d” “b---h” for disobeying him.
