

Grapes of Wrath Exam Information

- Will be a **Socratic Seminar**.

 - Questions, comments, connections, symbols, allusions, characters, setting, imagery—anything and everything that seems interesting about the text that you would like to discuss with your classmates.

Review: Literature Circles

• 3-4 member team.

- Each member has a certain task to do:
 - 1. Discussion Director: asks questions of the group
 - 2. Literary Luminary: locates *deep* passages for group to discuss
 - 3. Checker: evaluates individual and group participation
 - 4. Vocabulary Enricher: helps locate/define unfamiliar words
- Positions are rotated daily.
 - 1's \rightarrow 2's \rightarrow 3's \rightarrow 4's
 - $2's \rightarrow 3's \rightarrow 4's \rightarrow 1's$
 - $3's \rightarrow 4's \rightarrow 1's \rightarrow 2's$
 - 4's \rightarrow 1's \rightarrow 2's \rightarrow 3's

• 2's \rightarrow 3's \rightarrow 1's \rightarrow 2's (for 3 member group)

Hampton's Thoughts

- Super impressed with level of discussions
 - Tom = Casy (grafted religiousness to himself)
 - Sadness over Tom's leaving
 - Religious allusions in Tom's conversation
 - How would you react if you were Ma?

Review: Literature Circles

Lessons Learned

- 1. Discussion Director = <u>does not</u> have to use all conversation starters
- 2. Literary Luminary = there are many reasons to pick out a passage for discussion—check the list on the worksheet!
- 3. Checker = be honest; I will dock <u>YOUR</u> grade if you claim that someone has done the reading and they have not.
- 4. Vocabulary Enricher = guess from context clues, then use dictionary to confirm meaning of word.

- One of the biggest lines from American Literature, both because it's often tested and referred to is...
 - Tom Joad: I'll be all around in the dark I'll be everywhere. Wherever you can look – wherever there's a fight, so hungry people can eat, I'll be there. Wherever there's a cop beatin' up a guy, I'll be there. I'll be in the way guys yell when they're mad. I'll be in the way kids laugh when they're hungry and they know supper's ready, and when the people are eatin' the stuff they raise and livin' in the houses they build – I'll be there, too.
- Tom goes from a concrete noun to an abstract one; transcending the mortal world to the spiritual.

The Ghost of Tom Joad

- We'll be listening to a song, *The Ghost of Tom Joad* by Bruce Springsteen.
- It is one of my favorite songs (you don't have to love it!)
- Listen for: the merging of Tom and Casy and for a modified version of Tom's final lines.
