




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The General Paper Exam

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



The Puritans

- Time period: 1640 (150 years after Columbus)
- A group of religious "people" who separated themselves from the Catholic church in England.
 - "Escaped" to America
- Directly involved with "The Salem Witch Trials"



The Puritans

Beliefs:

- All sins should be punished (stealing, adultery, murder)
- Men are "rulers"; women subservient.
- When bad things happen, God is punishing the sinful.
- The devil is real...and very active.

Witchcraft

 Defined as the use of supernatural/magical powers.



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
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The Salem Witch Trials

- Began in 1692 (200 years after Columbus)
- Resulted in the executions of 20 people and the imprisonment of over 200 people.



Samuel Parris

- Samuel Parris, the Puritan minister of Salem, Massachusetts.
 - Not well liked in his congregation because of harsh preaching and rigid values.



Betty Parris


- "Witch Trials" began with Samuel's daughter, Betty...she:
 - Had an "epileptic fit."
 - Screamed, threw things around the room, uttered strange sounds, and crawled under furniture.
 - Also covered her ears when the Bible was read aloud.

The Salem Witch Trials

- This event spread throughout Salem, leading to hundreds of men and women being accused of "witchcraft."
- Official trials were set up to deal with all the accusations.
- Trials were based on "Spectral Evidence."

Spectral Evidence

- The "afflicted" (the person accused of witchcraft) claimed to see the ghost of a person who forced them to do witchcraft.
- First to be accused and executed:
 - Bridget Bishop
 - 60 years old
 - An outspoken woman, flashy in behavior
 - Last words: "I know not what I witch is"
- 1693 spectral evidence is banned; end of witch trials.
