


Euthanasia


- Means "good death"
- Practice of ending life, which relives pain and suffering of the patient.

Jack Kevorkian


- Was a medical doctor
- Believes in a patient's right to assisted suicide
 - Helped over 130
- Made own death machine: "Thanatron"
 - Death by injection; patient presses button that released chemicals, ending life.
- 1999: Began serving a 10-25 year life sentence for second-degree murder
 - Released in 2008
