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




Act IV Vocabulary

<u> Part 1 of 1:</u>

- Contention = opposition or rivalry in debate
- "Situation in Andover" = nearby town where the people revolted against the court
- Excommunication = kicked out of the Church
- Beguile = to trick
- Adamant = to be firm in belief; unyielding
- Gibbet = the place where people are hung to die
