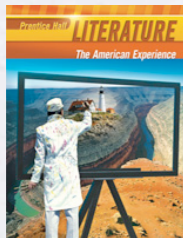

Concrete vs. Abstract Nouns

NOTES

- Concrete: things you can SEE directly.
 - Ex: car, Mr. Hampton, air, water
- Abstract: things that cannot be seen unless reflected in another object.
 - Ex: honor, loyalty, charity, happiness

Pronouns vs. Antecedents

NOTES

- Pronoun: takes the place of a noun
 - Ex: Mr. Hampton --> “he”
- Antecedent: the noun that has been substituted.
 - Ex: “Mr. Hampton gave his stereo away.”
antecedent *p.n.*

Action vs. Linking Verbs

- Action verbs: show what action someone or something is doing.
 - Ex: The telephone rings all day long.
- Linking verbs: connects the subject with another word or describes the subject.
 - Ex: His forehead feels cold.
 - Ex: Milk turns bad very quickly.

The Puritans

T A K E N O T E S

- Time period: 1640 (150 years after Columbus)
 - A group of religious “people” who separated themselves from the Catholic church in England.
 - “Escaped” to America

The Puritans

- Beliefs:
 - All sins should be punished (stealing, adultery, murder)
 - Men are “rulers”; women subservient.
 - When bad things happen, God is punishing the sinful.
 - The devil is real...and very active.

- Unfortunately, the Puritans are probably best known for their involvement in what is called, “The Salem Witch Trials.”

Witchcraft

T A K E N O T E S

- Defined as the use of supernatural/magical powers.

The Salem Witch Trials

T A K E N O T E S

- Began in 1692 (200 years after Columbus)
- Resulted in the executions of 20 people and the imprisonment of over 200 people.

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The Salem Witch Trials

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- Samuel Parris, the Puritan minister of Salem, Massachusetts.



The Salem Witch Trials

T A K E N O T E S

- Samuel Parris was not well liked in his congregation because of harsh preaching and rigid values.

The First “Victim”

NOTES

- Betty Parris, daughter of Samuel Parris had an “epileptic fit.”
- She screamed, threw things around the room, uttered strange sounds, and crawled under furniture.
- Also covered her ears when the Bible was read aloud.

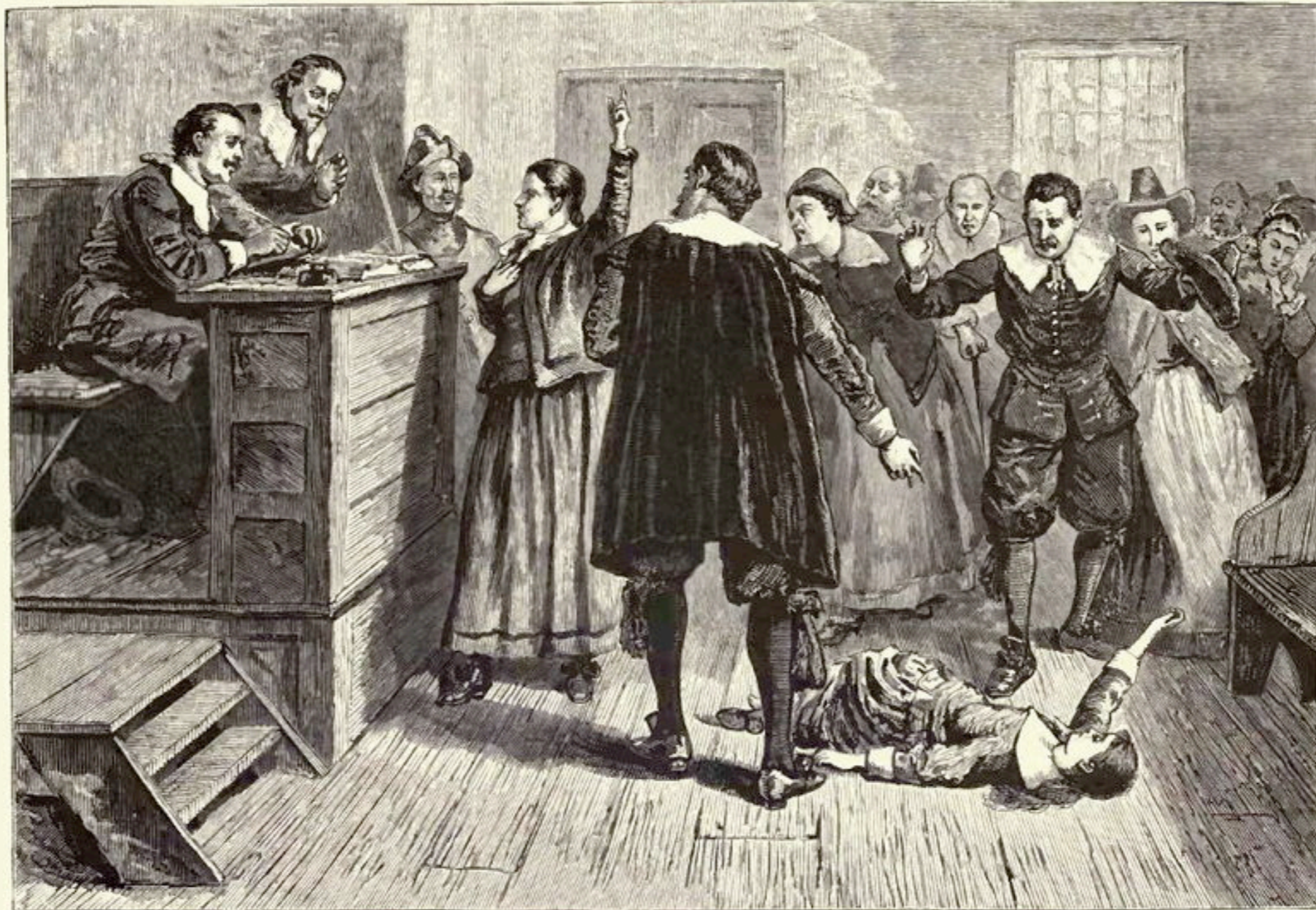
Mass Panic

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- This event spread throughout Salem, leading to hundreds of men and women being accused of “witchcraft.”
- Official trials were set up to deal with all the accusations.
- Trials were based on “Spectral Evidence.”

Mass Panic

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WITCHCRAFT AT SALEM VILLAGE.

Spectral Evidence

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- The “afflicted” (the person accused of witchcraft) claimed to see the ghost of a person who forced them to do witchcraft.

The First Execution

NOTES

- Bridget Bishop
 - Outspoken women, flashy in behavior.
 - Her death caused the least amount of dismay, as she was 60 years old at the time of her death.
 - Her last words: “I know not what a witch is.”

The First Execution

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Witch-hunt Ends

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- In 1693, Massachusetts banned spectral evidence from being used. This promptly put an end to the witch trials.

- Written in 1850
- Time in novel: 1650's
- Issues of roles of women, and adultery.
- 230 page novel
- Fiction
- Read at home
