

- A verb that is made up of more than one word is called a *verb phrase*.
- Helper verb + verb = verb phrase

Helper Verb

- Helper verbs:
 - × Will
 - × Should be/have
 - × Could be/have
 - × Would have
 - × Might be/have
 - × Has/had

- Example:
 - × By now, we <u>should have been</u> there.

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

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
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

Close Reading

Close reading = a close examination of a short piece of the text.
The section of text is highly dense and can be broken down and discussed.

Close Reading
