What is Poetry?

- Poetry can be:
- 1. Narrative—to tell a story
- 2. Emotive—to express an emotion

What is Poetry?

- Unfortunately, a lot of poetry is difficult to understand.
- Let's remove the difficult parts!



Metaphor


- A comparison between two things; <u>does not use</u> like or as
- Ex. "life is a box of chocolates."

Simile

- A comparison between two things; <u>does use</u> like or as
- Ex. "life is <u>like</u> a box of chocolates."

Symbol

- An object that stands (represents) something else.
- Ex. Christian "cross" or a king's crown.



Paradox

- A contradiction
 - Ex. Jumbo shrimp...a cold day in (....)

Onomatopoeia

- Words that sound like their meaning
- Ex. Bark, swoosh, cough

Hyperbole

- An exaggeration
 - Ex. "the fish was as big as a house."
