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### Review: Rhetorical Devices

- Repetition: restating the same idea using the same words.
- Restatement: restating the same idea using different words.
- Parallelism: repeating a grammatical structure.
- Antithesis: using strongly contrasting words or ideas.
- Rhetorical Question(s): asking questions for an effect—the author already knows the answer.

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• Allusion: a reference from another story, usually biblical.
