Elements of Romanticism in YGB

Celebration of the Self

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- ✓ Introspection of Self (thinking about the self)
- ✓ Nature > Everything Else
- Nature is ultimate source of inspiration
- □ Human beings are independent and self-reliant
- ✓ Supernatural foreshadowing (dreams, visions, etc.)
- Emotional intensity of main character
- ✓ Plot arranged around a single crisis moment
- ✓ Description of scene lengthy, but establishes mood and emotion
