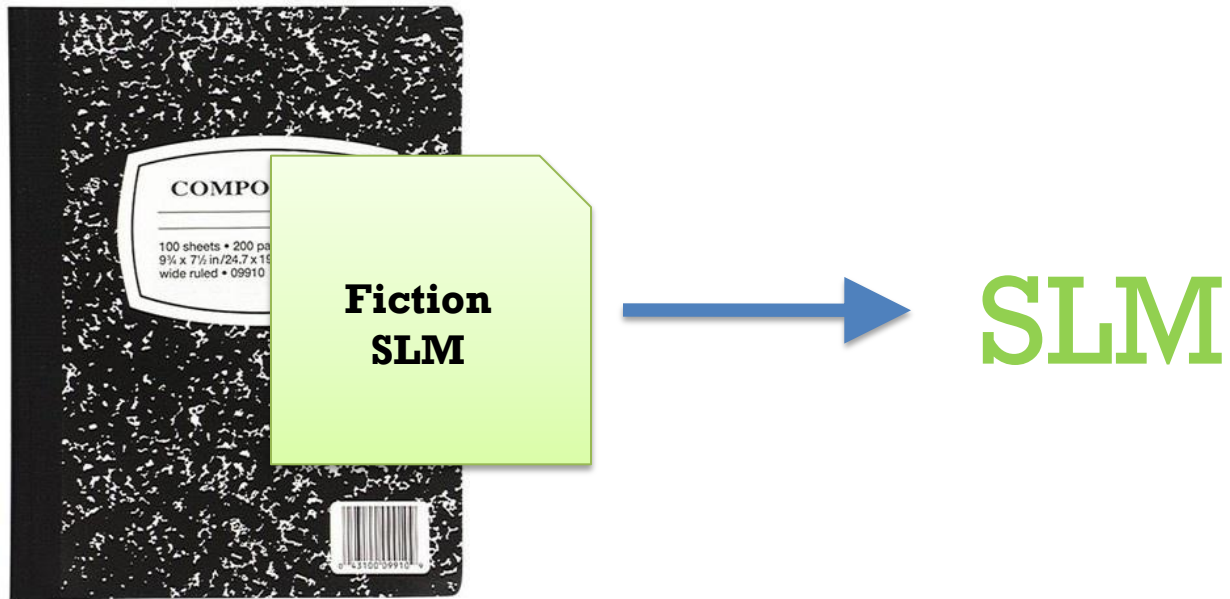

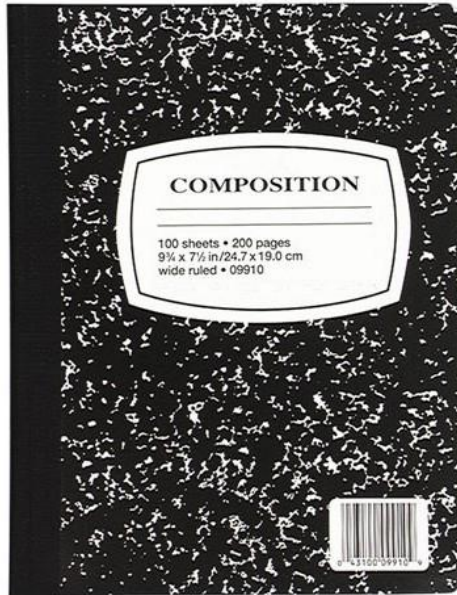

Theme

- Shares some similarities with the “main idea” of a story, but theme is focused on “the human condition”

The Human Condition

- What it means to be human:
 - To live
 - To suffer
 - To love
 - To hate
 - To experience loss
 - A chance to rebuild your life after disaster
 - Etc.

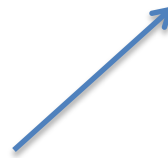


Main Idea vs. Theme vs. Moral

- Main Idea = what the whole story is about
- Theme = how it relates to being a human
- Moral = a lesson designed for children to learn from

How to Pick Out Theme

Look at:

- Characters
 - What happens to them?
 - Their relationships with others
 - Difficult choices made (sacrifice, etc.)
 - Did they learn something at the end?

Themes this Year

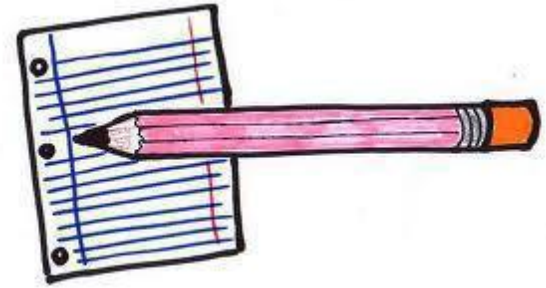
Labyrinth / Monkey's Paw:

Quick Writes

T A K E N O T E S

- A writing response, usually with a guiding question
- Goal is to write without stopping
 - Usually 3 minutes.
- Builds stamina over time
- Hampton writes along with you

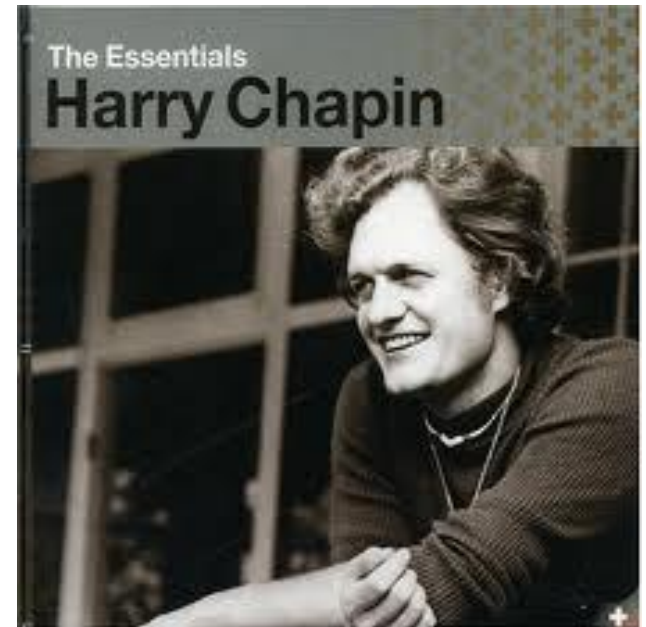


Activator: *Cat's in the Cradle*
