



Part B on Language Analysis

- Is about duplicating the style of the original
 - Lots of repetition?
 - Lots of description?
 - Lots of metaphors?
 - You must duplicate this
- Typically 100-150 words (about a ½ page)
- Usually will ask for an alternate point of view or to write about a different setting than the original



CAUTION ON PART B

Sometimes Part A and Part B look like this:

(a) Comment on the style and language of the passage.

[15]

- (b) The same restaurant receives a very favourable review from another writer. Basing your answer closely on the material of the original extract, write the opening (between 120-150 words) of the review.
- Sometimes Part A and Part B look like this:
 - (a) Basing your answer closely on the style and language of the original extract, write a beginning for the story (between 120–150 words). [10]
 - (b) Compare the style and language of your piece with the style and language of the original extract. [15]
 - Part A is the short part, and Part B is 13-15 comments...but you can also mention your own words in your composition as well as the original
