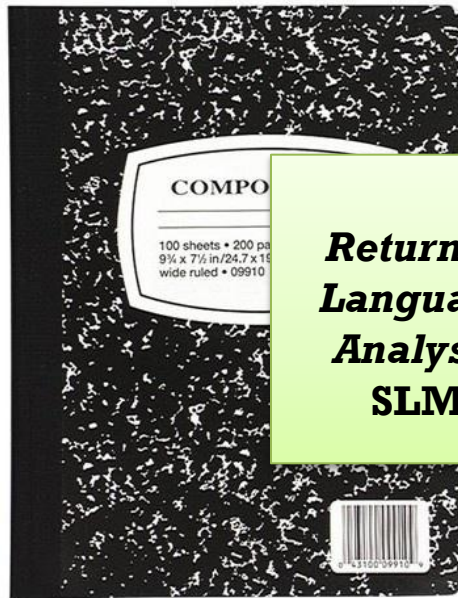

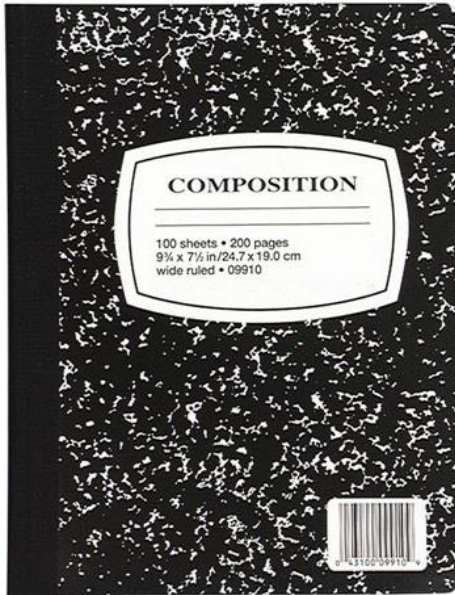

Part B on Language Analysis

T A K E N O T E S

- Is about duplicating the style of the original
 - Lots of repetition?
 - Lots of description?
 - Lots of metaphors?
 - *You must duplicate this*
- Typically 100-150 words (about a ½ page)
- Usually will ask for an alternate point of view or to write about a different setting than the original



CAUTION ON PART B

- **Sometimes Part A and Part B look like this:**

- (a) Comment on the style and language of the passage. [15]
- (b) The same restaurant receives a very favourable review from another writer. Basing your answer closely on the material of the original extract, write the opening (between 120-150 words) of the review. [10]

- **Sometimes Part A and Part B look like this:**

- (a) Basing your answer closely on the style and language of the original extract, write a beginning for the story (between 120–150 words). [10]
- (b) Compare the style and language of your piece with the style and language of the original extract. [15]

- **Part A is the short part, and Part B is 13-15 comments...but you can also mention your own words in your composition as well as the original**

- Review over notes on Language Analysis (5.24-5.30)
 - Know the steps (especially reading prompt header for tone/mood) for L.A.
 - Make sure to select 2 stories out of the 3 they give you.
 - Do Part A and Part B for both
 - Part A = aim for 13-15 “comments”
 - Spend about 1 hour on first story, 1 hour on second
 - No points* for identifying; explain what *effect* of word is
- Get a good night's sleep; don't panic
