



Moral Dilemma

- A problem or situation with no right or wrong answer
- Best answer = opinions supported by strong reasons (feelings, evidence, knowledge, etc.)

Non-Example	Example:
A train is running out of control	
down a track. In its path are 15	
people who have been tied to	
the track. Fortunately, you can	
flip a switch that will lead the	
train down a different track to	
avoid hitting the 15 people,	
which would save their lives.	
Should you flip the switch?	

Non-Example	Example:
	A train is hurtling down a track towards 15 people. The only way you can stop the train is by dropping a very heavy weight in front of it to save the 15 people. You notice there is a very fat man who could be pushed on the track to save the 15 people. However, doing this will kill the one <i>very fat</i> man to save the 15 people.
	Should you push the very fat man on the track to save the 15 people?

Heinz Dilemma (General Paper)

- A woman was near death from cancer. There was one drug that the doctors thought might save her. The drug was expensive, but the druggist was charging ten times what the drug cost him to make; he paid \$200 for the drug and charged \$2,000 for it.
- The sick woman's husband, Heinz, went to everyone he knew to borrow the money, but he could only get together about \$1,000, which is half of what it would cost. He told the druggist that his wife was dying and asked him to sell it cheaper or let him pay later. But, the druggist said: "No, I discovered the drug and I have to make money from it to feed my family."
- So, Heinz got desperate and broke into the man's store and stole the drug for his wife.

<u>Respond:</u> Should Heinz have broken into the lab to steal the drug for his wife? Why or why not? Look at the passage above and use examples for your reasoning.



- SITUATION #1: A man is in prison because he has killed someone. He is on "death row" waiting to be killed by lethal injection.
- SITUATION #2: A woman is ill with cancer and is in extreme pain on a daily basis. She wants to die by euthanasia (assisted suicide by injection).
- SITUATION #3: Suspected terrorists are living in a remote area of the world. The government plans to send a bomb to kill them.
 Unfortunately, doing so will kill some civilians who are not terrorists.

QUESTION: Look at these situations. Would it ever be "right" to end a person's life in any of these circumstances? Why or why not? Explain your answer. What factors in these situations influence your decision?
