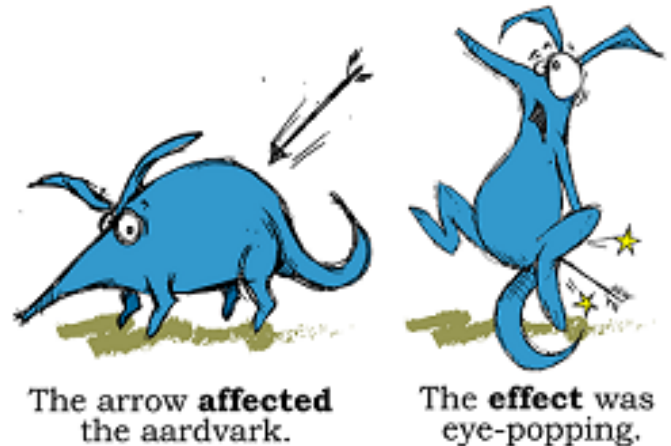

- Affect = verb (an action)

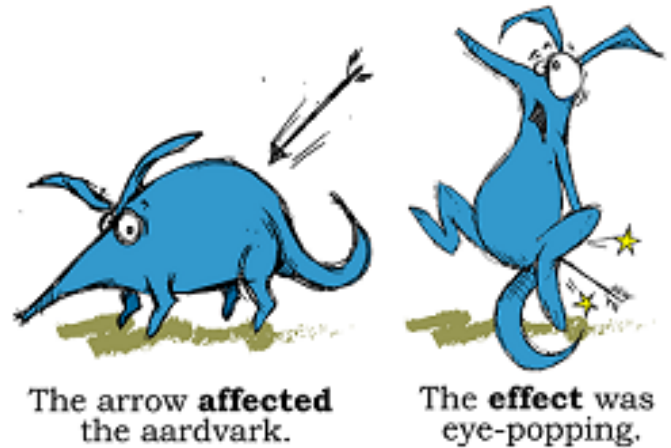

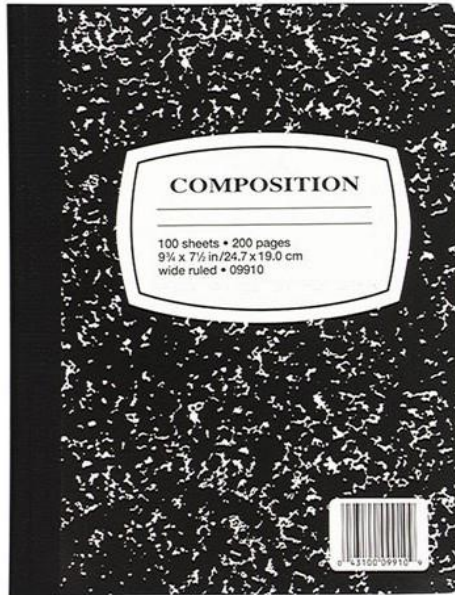
T A K E N O T E S

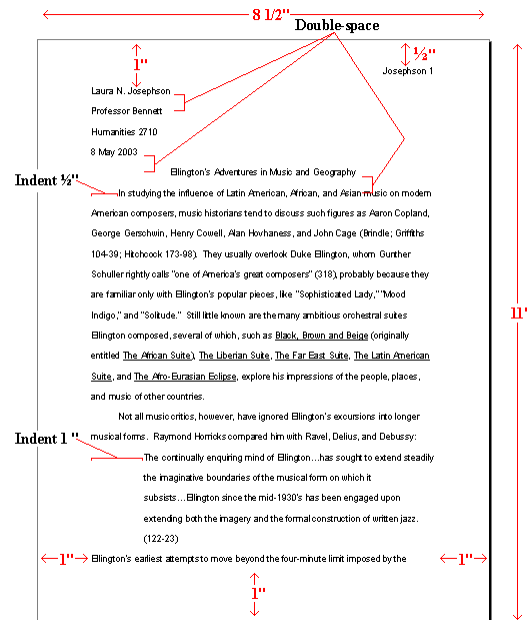

Why Citations?

T A K E N O T E S

- In college—your thoughts must be supported by what occurs in the text.
- Citing—mentioning who and where your source comes from—avoid plagiarism.



Why A Works Cited Page?

T A K E N O T E S

- In-text citations only provide author and page number.
- Works Cited tells what book, when it was published, so sources can be confirmed.

First line of each entry is at the left margin; extra lines are indented 1/2".

Double-spacing is used throughout.

Abbreviation "n.d." indicates that the online source has no update date.

Thesis Statement

T A K E N O T E S

- **Follow Rule #1 about MLA**
- Changes depending on subject
 - English thesis different than History thesis
- A quick 1-2 sentence opener that helps the reader generalize your ideas



Thesis Statement

Three Parts

1. A subject = title of work and author
2. A method = a technique, device the author uses
3. A message = an idea or lesson the author wants the reader to consider



Thesis Statement Examples

- In *Rabbit, Run*, John Updike uses biblical names to reveal deeper insight into his characters and their personalities.
- In *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest*, McMurphy, the Chief and the Big Nurse, are excellent examples of Sigmund Freud's Id, Ego and Super ego.
- In *The Grapes of Wrath*, John Steinbeck uses one family's journey as a metaphor for the hardships experienced by all families during the dustbowl.

MLA Template

- No need to format own paper
- Pbworks website has MLA template with header, title, page number, Works Cited page, etc.
