



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

Historical Criticism


- Examining a work of literature as a product of history
- Can require research
- Can be looked at two ways:
 - Time period written in
 - Time period story is about
- Benefit: to learn about history while reading
- Negative: Facts can be warped and non-historical





- Time written about:
 - **1692**
 - Learn about Salem, witch trials, spectral evidence, etc.
- Time written in:
 - 1952
 - Allegory for "The Red Scare" (communism)






Philosophical Criticism

- Examining a work of literature and its ability to give answers to the deepest questions of life: what is good/evil, does life have meaning, etc.
 - Greeks: Thought "literature" must deal with discussing these questions.


Sub-Branches:

- Ethos = right vs. wrong
- Aesthetics = what is beauty...can literature be immoral / unethical?




Ender's Game

- Philosophical question:
 - Do the needs of the many outweigh the needs of the few?
 - Is it ever "good" to kill someone?
 - Why do we fear what we don't understand?



Genre Criticism


- Comparing and contrasting literature by its genre:
 - Western, musical, "chick flick," fantasy, sci-fi, etc.
- Benefits:
 - If you know what's coming, you can anticipate how to best approach it
- Limitation:
 - Most writers want to break out of "the norm"
 - Not all works can fit a nice, prepackaged genre



TAKE NOTES

The Crucible

- Looked at through romance genre:
 - ✓ Focus on relationship, between two people
 - Major conflict must be about the relationship
 - Contains both elements of comedy and drama
 - Must have an emotionally satisfying ending
 - Reward "good" character, while punishing "evil"
