





Point of View

- Refers to two (2) things:
 - 1. "The Persons" = 1st, 2nd, 3rd (what perspective does the narrator have in the story?)
 - 2. "The People" = the specific character that is telling the story



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<u>POV</u>	<u>+</u>	Ξ
1ST	Deep, personal thoughts	Narrator is biased; does not "see" everything
2ND	Reader is part of story	Can be childish if not done correctly
3RD	Narrator can know things characters do not; the most professional sounding	Difficult to make reader feel involved in story


