

Literature Circles Roles

- Each person has a unique role:
 - In group of 4, you have 4 roles
 - In group of 5, you have 5 roles
 - In group of 6, you have 6 roles
- Roles rotated every "discussion day" (2/week)
- Use worksheet as a guide (do not write on it); your role goes inside your notebook as a READING LOG



Role 1: Discussion Director

- Asks questions to team to increase understanding of what has been read.
- Examples:
 - Why do you think ____ happened?
 - How did you feel about _____?
 - Etc.

Role #1: DISCUSSION DIRECTOR

The Discussion Director asks questions to the team to increase their understanding of what was read. Possible conversation starters could include, but are not limited to:

group and states the reasons for choosing these selections. Role 3: Vocabulary Guru

Role 4: Illustrator

- Your sketch / drawing can be about:

Role #4: ILLUSTRATOR

The Illustrator sketches / draws 3-4 of their favorite scenes from your reading. Your drawings do not have to be colored, but for the ease and grade of your group, it is recommended that you put a full effort into your work. Your sketch / drawing can be about:

- Something you read
- Something that the reading reminded you of
- An element of the story (plot, character, setting, etc.)

When sharing with your team, show your picture without commenting on what you drew and have your team guess at what your picture means. When they are done, you may tell them what it means, where it came from, or what it represents to you.

Role 5/6: Connector
