

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
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# **Theme**

- "The human side" or emotional connection to the story
- Concerned with how the story relates to being a human...
  - Living, dying, loving, hating, experiencing pleasure, loss, overcoming obstacles, etc.
- "The Human condition" = something all/most humans experience in their life


# Finding the Theme

- Key = look at characters
  - What happens to them?
  - How do they interact with others?
  - Do they make difficult choices?
  - Do they learn some lesson at the end?
