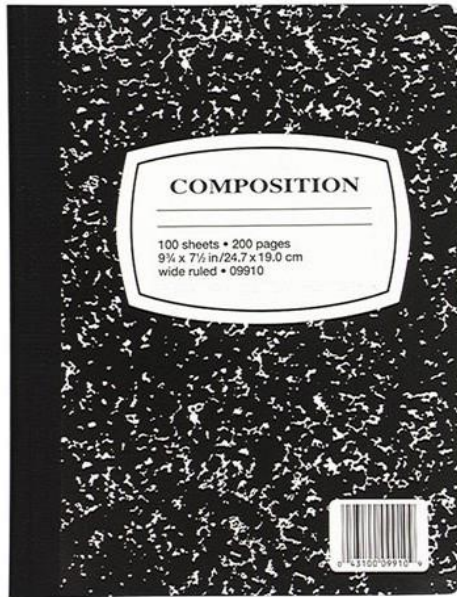

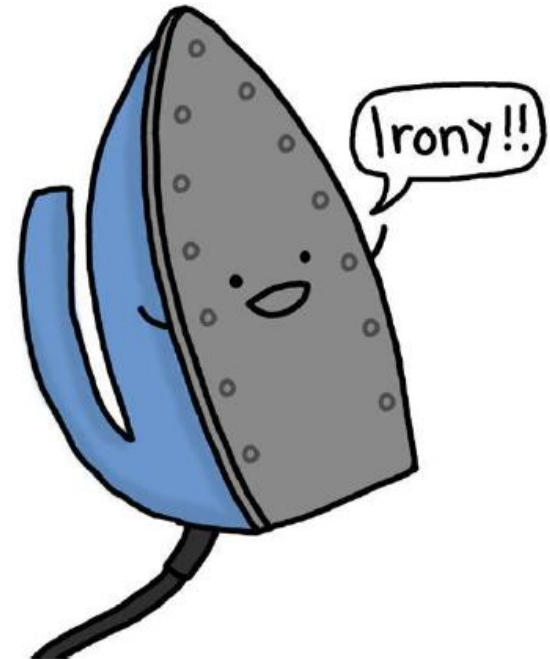

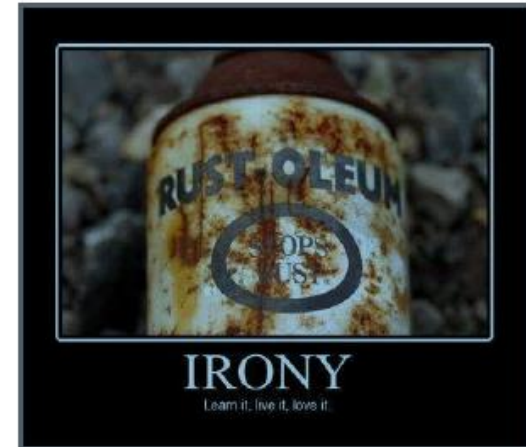
- Is broken down into different types:

- When the expectation of an event does not match up with the reality of what happens



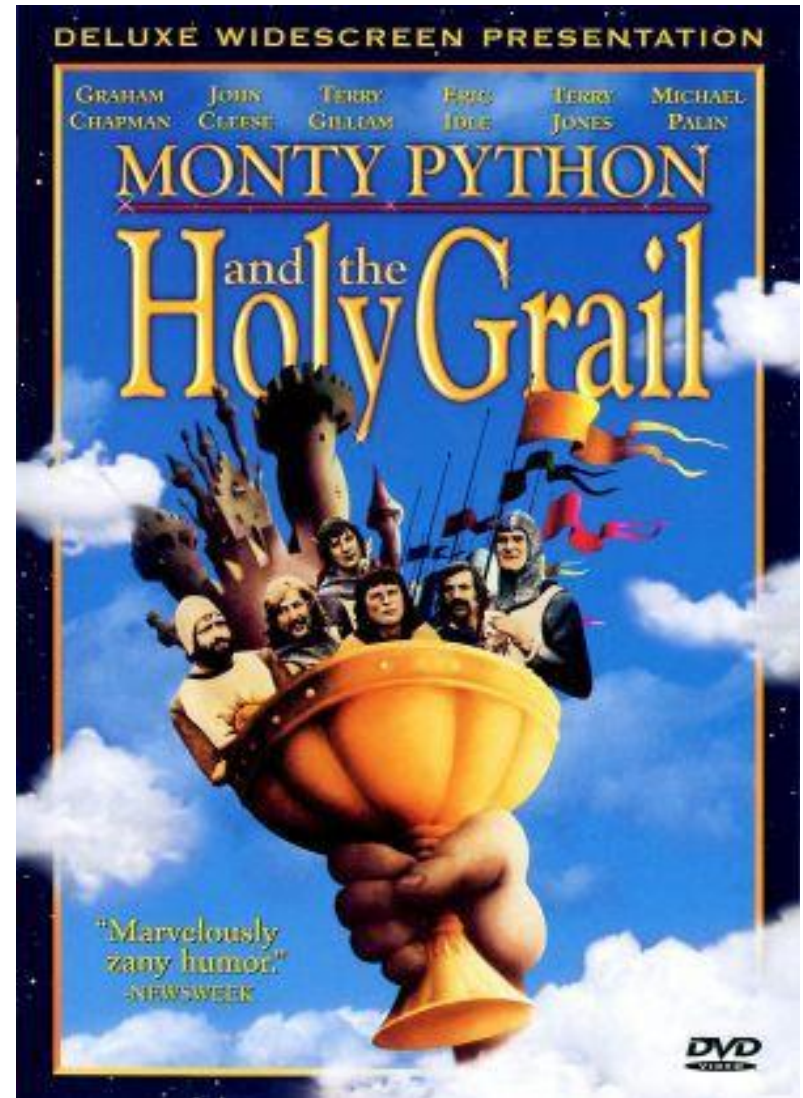
