Verb Tenses

- “Bob *cook* a pizza when he was alive” OR
- “Bob *cooked* a pizza every day when he was alive”

- **Verb tenses** tell you:
 - **What** action took place
 - **When** that action took place

- Two types of verbs:
 - Regular
 - Irregular



Verb Shifting

- SAT/ACT loves to shift verbs; you find the error in shifting
 - “By 4:00, all the bushes *had been pruned* and the grass *was* mowed.”
 - Should be “had been pruned” and “had been mowed”
- Every verb in a sentence does not have to be in the same tense...more on this next week!
 - Henry *lost* (*past*) a \$20 that *has now been found* (*present perfect*)



Advanced Verb Shifting

Ask yourself:

- Are two different time periods in the sentence?
 - Yes = can have verb tense shifts
 - No = sentence must be corrected

Example:

- YES = Henry lost a \$20 that has now been found.
- NO = At the same time I lost hope, a stranger jumps off of a boat and swam towards me.



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Practice: *Verb Shifting*

Correct the errors in shifting, if present:

1. English colonists who settled in Massachusetts receive assistance from the Indians.
2. In 1675, Phillip leads the Wamponoag tribe in a series of attacks on colonial settlements.
3. This attack, later known as King Phillip's War, raged on for over a year and leaves three thousand Indians dead.
4. Mrs. Rowland, a survivor of the war, is a minister's wife who was kidnapped and holds captive for several days.
5. Reading the narrative earlier today, I realize that it does not tell a complete story; but, it shows its author to be a keen observer.
