




"Mary likes hiking, biking, and to swim"

- Defined as using the same pattern of words; also shows that two or more ideas have the same importance level in a sentence.
- Simple: "I like to dance and to sing."
 or "I like singing and dancing."
- Complex: "The student wrote his report quickly, accurately, and in a detailed manner."



Use P.S., especially when:


- 1. Elements joined by a conjunction INCORRECT: Your company, and what its potential is, are of great value to us.
- 2. Elements are in a list or series INCORRECT: The tribes emphasized survival, mutual aid, and being responsible.
- 3. If elements are being compared INCORRECT: I like swimming more than to dive.
- 4. If elements are joined by a linking verb INCORRECT: To succeed is opening a new door into prosperity.



Rhetorical Devices

- Techniques used by an author or speaker in a speech
- Contributes to a "good" speech


Restatement vs. Repetition

- Repetition: repeating the same idea using the same words
- Restatement: repeating the same idea using different words

Repetition Repetition Repetition

Rhetorical Question(s)

- When the speaker asks a question for dramatic effect; speaker does not want a response
- Answer is typically obvious




Parallelism

- Repeats a grammatical structure of a sentence
- See GT #15



Antithesis

- Using strongly contrasting (different) words or idea
- Good vs. Evil, Heaven vs. Hell, etc.




<u>Anaphora</u>

 Repetition of the same word at the beginning of a sentence



Allusion

- A reference to another work, usually well-known
- Fairy Tales, Bible, Declaration of Independence, Bill of Rights, etc.
