Rhyme Scheme

- Refers to the way the end word in a line rhymes with the next line's end word.
- Usually uses letters to describe rhyme:
 - A / B / C / etc.
 - Common scheme: ABAB
- Bid me to weep, and I will weep While I have eyes to see;
 And having none, and yet I will keep A heart to weep for thee.



Repetition

- Repeating of a sound, syllable, word, or phrase.
 - Tomorrow, and tomorrow (Macbeth)
 - The buzz saw snarled and rattled, snarled and rattled (Out, out--)
 - "I want...I want" (What Women Want)



The Raven Vocabulary







- Reference to...




